3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

- 3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution
 - ➤ The IQAC encouraged teachers to undertake Major and Minor projects funded by UGC/ DST/ CSIR and other funding agencies. A Major Research Project and two Minor Research Projects were sanctioned by the UGC during the year.
 - ➤ The IQAC maintained close correspondence with the Research Committee in connection with different research projects.
 - The central Research Laboratory, also known as P C Roy Central Research Laboratory, for Science based research activities has been running successfully and research projects (minor and major) are carried out there. The IQAC ensured that the laboratory was used properly for research activities.
 - > The Mitchell Sky Observatory under the supervision of the Head of the department of Physics was used for observations and experimentations. The IQAC took care that researchers as well as students were involved.
 - The Automatic Weather Station of the department of Geography provided important weather-related information to the college as well as to the community at large and the data collected so far were used for researches of varied nature. The online display of Weather information is auto updated on our college website.
 - ➤ Wesleyan Journal of Research, a multi-disciplinary peer-reviewed (ISSN: 0975-1386) journal, being published since 2008, has earned national repute and has attempted to promote research publications of varied disciplines. The IQAC assisted the Editorial Board in promoting research publications.
 - ➤ Appropriations, a peer-reviewed ISSN (0975-1521) journal, published by the department of English (since 2005), provideded opportunities for researchers for serious academic discourses in English Litirature and English Language.
 - > Teachers were motivated to pursue doctoral researches, engage themselves in publishing their research papers, attend and present papers in national and international seminars/ conferences/ workshops, etc.
 - > The IQAC extended full cooperation to different departments in organizing seminars or conferences and three seminars were organized, one each by History, English and Zoology Departments.

Class tests, Midterm tests, Term End tests are conducted on regular basis and the students are allowed to appear in University Exams based on the performance in these tests.

The Research Committee puts utmost effort to ensure Research activities of the teachers.

Regular publication of two research journals adds to the academic excellence of the Institution.

A number of Minor Research Projects are being carried out now along with a Major Research

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Open access is given to the students for extensive use of the Library. The Library has been fully digitized. A number of reputed journals are regularly subscribed by the Institution. There is a separate wing in the Library for the Post Graduate Departments (English & Bengali). There are specialized departmental libraries.

The teachers made use of projectors, notebooks, OHP, smart board, to enhance the teaching learning process.

The Automatic Weather Station in the Dept of Geography and the Observatory in the Dept of Physics helped the teachers, the students as well as the research scholars of other institutions immensely in the collection and the analysis of resources.

The IR Photo-spectrometer in the Central Research Laboratory facilitated research activities of multiple disciplines.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The College as a Minority Institution enjoys recruitment autonomy both for its teaching and non-teaching faculties. The relevant UGC and State Government Rules and Regulations were strictly adhered to. The Selection Committees are duly constituted by the Governing Body of the College as per the Rules for Management of Bankura Christian College.

Students were admitted in the Graduation courses strictly on the basis of merit. The Admission Committee of the College conducts the online-counselling of the students every year.

Analysis of feedback from 3rd Year students (2012-13)

Third year students (Academic year 2012-13) have given their feedback during their midterm examination on eleven different issues using five point-scale. Out of eleven issues, seven were related to teachers and four others related to library and office related issues. The following issues were given in the self administered anonymous questionnaire.

- 1. Regularity of teacher
- 2. Punctuality of teacher
- 3. Substantial coverage of the syllabus by the teacher
- 4. Detailed explanation for better understanding by the teacher
- 5. Resourcefulness/ Scholarship of the teacher
- 6. Assistance beyond class room by the teacher
- 7. Overall feedback of the teacher
- 8. Overall feedback of the office staff
- 9. Satisfaction regarding stock of books in college library
- 10. Satisfaction regarding availability of books in college library
- 11. Behaviour / Cooperation of library staff

Students were asked to provide individual teacher-wise feedback. Filled up feedback forms were entered into MS Excel and analysed by the IQAC team members. The analysis shows (Annexure-1) the relative position of a teacher on different aspects from the ideal state (100%). Individual teacher-wise analysis was carried out for the seven above stated indicators. Table 1.1 and 1.2 below represent the teachers who have scored 80% or below for the above mentioned 7 indicators.

Following teachers fall under that category: four teachers of Bengali department, two teachers of political science department, one teacher of sociology department, three teachers of physics department, two teachers of chemistry department and one teacher of mathematics department. Following table shows the strengths and weaknesses of different departments in terms of various indicators. The top row represents departments and numbers and the parenthesis represents total number of teachers in the respective departments.

Overall performance of the teachers in various departments is satisfactory. But in four departments, namely Bengali, Political sciences, Sociology and Physics, a higher proportion of teachers did not score 80% on various indicators. The IQAC team of the college met such teachers individually and shared the feedback provided by the students. They were suggested to take remedial measures to improve their drawbacks as pointed out by the students.
